## Boat removal progressing in Hurricane Hole

ST. JOHN — Salvage company Donjon Marine continued its effort this week to remove hurricane-damaged boats and debris from Hurricane Hole's Princess Bay, Borck Creek, Otter Creek, and Water Creek, along with Mary Creek and Leinster Bay.

The operation is expected to move to Hassel Island on Friday as part of a two week-long process to clear the territory's National Park waters.

Many boat owners have cleared their vessels from the Virgin Islands National Park's storm refuge in the months since Irma, leaving 49 vessels in Hurricane Hole, most of which are beyond repair.

The largest concentration of wreckage was found in Princess Bay, where boats were piled on one another along the shoreline and sunk within the bay.

Donjon, which was hired by the U.S. Navy at the request of the park, has been working 12-hour days since Aug. 14, using a sling to pull up boats that are relatively intact, and a clamshell to recover boats that were broken to pieces during the storm.

Boat owners who wished to attempt to repair their damaged vessels were permitted to haul their boats out of Hurricane Hole once they were recovered by Donjon. The entire salvage operation is being funded with U.S. taxpayer money, said park Superintendent Steve Black.

"We wanted it to happen faster, but things like this take time," Black said. The superintendent noted that Resolve Marine, which was hired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency to salvage vessels in the territory earlier this year under the direction of the Department of Planning and Natural Resources and the U.S. Coast Guard,

could not address the wreckage in park waters due to the Stafford Act provision that prevents one federal entity from working for another.

The park needed congressional approval to fund the salvage effort, which was granted in February. The park didn't see that money until June 14, Black said, delaying the removal of

boats in park waters.

While park officials awaited the beginning of the Hurricane Hole salvage operation, they cleared debris from mangrove roots and verified there was no risk of fuel spillage, said park Natural Resources Manager Thomas Kelley.

The wrecked vessels recovered dur-

ing the park salvage job will be transferred to a 400-foot-long barge that arrived in the territory last week, then taken to Jacksonville, Fla., for disposal. Donjon Marine worked at a pace of removing around one vessel per hour.

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Kelley noted that Hurricane Hole's storm chain system remained intact during Irma; much of the wreckage was caused by cleat, anchor, and line failures.

"It was Hurricane Hole's first real test since the mooring chain system was installed around 2004 and 2005," said Kelley.

Chief of Natural Resources Management for the southeast region Darrell Echols, who's acting as the project lead, said the fact that some boats can be recovered and restored makes the salvage effort slower and trickier. Though park officials had a good handle on the number of boats to be salvaged and their locations, they did find one surprise in Princess Bay.

"We found a wreck we didn't know was there," said Echols. "It looks like it exploded. There's debris extending out to 50 to 70 yards around it. Other than that, things are playing out the way we expected."

The salvage operation is expected to wrap up on Tuesday.


### Carolina Corral free back-to-school fun day Oct. 13
