St. John places America Hill

If you've ever spent time at Maho Bay, you might have noticed the remains of a building perched high up on the hill of the southwestern ridge that frames the bay.

This is the America Hill Great House, and the sweeping views you can see from here are as fantastical as the site's history.

The great house, cook house, and cistern are believed to date back to the early 18th century, and the great house was used as a guest house for island visitors into the early 1900s.

It is said that Dominican Republic dictator Rafael Trujillo was one of the guests at America Hill, and the site is known to have been used

as a lookout point for rum runners during the days of prohibition.

The guest house is unique among other Danish ruins on the island, with its red-tinted coral lime plaster facade, and the views over Maho and Francis beaches and out to Tortola are stunning.

Hurricane Hugo took the remains of the estate house's roof, but some of the neoclassical detailing remains.

GET THERE: The trail head is across the road from the Cinnamon Bay parking lot, and it's less than a mile hike up the Cinnamon Bay trail to get to the America Hill great house. The trail starts off at a pretty steep incline, but the trek up the hill is worth the experience.
